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MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Your everyday actions are ushering in an era of unparalleled freedom and safety for children, women and men around the world.

This has been a year of staggering landmarks and pioneering work in the history of ending modern slavery.

Each step forwards is a hard-fought victory. I'm so proud of this growing community of IJM partners and supporters who help make this progress possible.

Time and time again, you show up. You show up with your resources, your time, your voice.

This has enabled a year of astonishing progress:

- You helped rescue 8,980 victims from slavery and violence.
- You helped train 34,440 government officials and community members.
- In July 2022 Kenya, the Mavoko 3 found justice in a conviction six years in the making. This was a landmark victory in the fight to address police abuse of power.
- In September 2022 Philippines, IJM passed the milestone of 1,000 children rescued from the online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC).

There have been challenges too. In Asia Pacific, we've seen the emergence of a new crime – forced scamming.

People from over 35 countries have been tricked by false job ads, luring and trapping them into enormous scamming compounds, where they are forced to work for online scam operations. Your ongoing support has enabled us to be strategically positioned as an organisation to respond immediately to this new form of slavery. We have already helped over 200 people in their escape and repatriation to their home country.

Our 2030 vision is to rescue millions and protect 500 million globally. The hardest part of the journey is still to come. In order to reach this vision we'll need to fight harder, run faster and innovate on a greater scale than ever before.

Because modern slavery refuses to disappear quietly - it fights back and so must we.

As some of you may have heard, I have some personal news to share. After three years serving as CEO at IJM Australia, and having seen incredible gains made in this movement during that time, I have decided that it is time for my partnership and support of IJM's mission to change in the coming season. It comes with a heavy heart but also with joy as I will be continuing to support IJM in new ways.

I am as dedicated to this mission as ever, having just visited one of our Southeast Asia offices and seen up close the devastation that modern slavery, in the form of forced scamming, is having in our world. My change in season doesn't change the need, the solution, or my commitment to being a part of global protection.

Know that your partnership is making the vision of protecting half a billion people a reality. Together, we have begun and continue to create an unstoppable movement to end slavery once and for all.

This report will give you a glimpse at the size of your impact. While there are many large numbers in this report, each number represents a real person. Your help is saving real lives and transforming nations.

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

While International Justice Mission started 25 years ago, IJM Australia was only established less than 10 years ago. We have the global infrastructure and accountability of a quarter century year old development organisation, with the local entrepreneurial spirit of a startup business.

When IJM's mission had just started 25 years ago, rescue seemed 'impossible'.

Children were enslaved inside brothels without hope. Perpetrators had no fear of consequences for their crimes. People were trapped with no path to escape. When we saw the suffering of millions, we knew something had to change.

We are now at the moment in history where IJM has real, concrete data that our model of change works. And it is happening on a scale that the world has never seen.

Our vision is twofold. It doesn't stop at rescue - we are chasing protection.

We have seen violence and modern slavery reduced by 50%-86% in nine different projects around the world. We have rescued over 85,000 people, and protected over 10.4 million. But we won't stop here.

At the start of our global mission, rescuing even one child seemed 'impossible.' Today, over 1,000 children have been rescued from the online sexual exploitation of children by IJM and Australian supporters have been instrumental in that. Imagine how many more won't ever have to be abused in the first place because of our collective, continual work.

Today, protecting half a billion might seem like an outrageous goal. Some might say it is 'impossible.' But our experience has taught us that radical transformation only happens when we are brave enough to try.

Whilst we celebrate the global achievements of this mission, I believe it is important to acknowledge IJM Australia's CEO, Steve Baird at this transition time. During his tenure, we've seen significant movement with Australians in all spheres of life taking action against modern slavery.

We are strategically positioning ourselves in the fight to protect half a billion. It will require inviting in every new partner and supporter we can find.

We are changing the narrative. We are making justice that seems 'impossible' into justice that is *unstoppable*.

Thank you for being courageous partners with us on this journey.

Our vision is to rescue millions, and protect 500 million from slavery and violence worldwide. Our vision is audacious, but not impossible.

OUR MISSION

OUR MODEL

IJM's point of difference as an organisation is our proven Theory of Change: strengthening local justice systems.

How We Operate: Global Programs & Jurisdictions

IJM have almost a dozen global programs, within which we have identified 56 specific jurisdictions around the world to apply our model by 2030.

While these locations are spread out across continents, they all have two things in common: each jurisdiction contains horrific violence and the potential for dramatic transformation.

The ultimate goal of each jurisdiction is to strengthen local justice systems. When local justice systems are equipped and strengthened to maintain justice independently, IJM's work is complete and we close up office. Success for IJM looks like completed and closed jurisdictions. We've already completed nine jurisdictions with a successful 50%-86% decrease in violence of targeted casework.

IJM reduced slavery and violence by 50-86% in nine different jurisdictions around the world.





How we create lasting change: The Global Protection Model

IJM have developed a proven model to combat injustice. We call this our Global Protection Model. Our model centres on strengthening local justice systems. This ensures lasting change, long after IJM has gone.

This model means we can bring justice at scale. We believe that through this model, IJM are uniquely

equipped and positioned to permanently dismantle systemic injustice through sustainable local transformation. We have a roadmap to protect 500 million people through this model and it's already rolling out. Now we need financial partners to ensure we can see it through.











PHASE 1: Government buy in

Government engages with key stakeholders on protection.

PHASE 2: Government Involvement

Government takes new actions to protect people in collaboration with key stakeholders.

PHASE 3: Government independent change

Government takes independent actions to strengthen its response to [case type].

PHASE 4: Government infrastructure


Government implements necessary conditions to address [case type] in a systemic matter.

ENDING ONLINE SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OF CHILDREN

The online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC) is one of the world's fastest growing crimes.

Program Casework

OSEC occurs when traffickers use the internet to sell the sexual abuse of young children over live video calls and other online content. The median age of victims is 11 years old, the youngest child rescued is only 2 months old. The Philippines is the global epicentre, as the crime is starting to spread to new countries. Australians are the third highest users of OSEC material in the world.

IJM's Work

IJM Philippines was one of the first organisations to identify OSEC as it emerged in 2011-2014. IJM Philippines is now the global leader in the fight against OSEC. IJM, the Philippine government and global authorities have already worked together to rescue more than 1,000 victims of OSEC and arrest 100 online child sex traffickers. In the Philippines our team has developed a proven model of protection to strengthen justice systems. This model is now ready to scale to new countries as this crime continues to spread.



Azalea's Story

Azalea* was just 14 years old when her neighbour groomed and coerced her to repeatedly perform shocking and unthinkable sex acts directed by online sex offenders. Azalea was rescued in an operation led by the National Bureau of Investigation - Anti Human Trafficking Division, with support from the Department of Social Welfare and Development, and IJM.

Despite threats to her safety, Azalea testified against her perpetrator who is now awaiting the court's conviction sentencing. After years of aftercare and counselling, Azalea is now restored with dreams of becoming a lawyer.

In 2023, the Philippines Survivor Network was established. Azalea is a survivor leader in this group, advocating alongside other survivors and IJM for stronger protection from violence and sexual exploitation of children in the Philippines.

ENDING FORCED LABOUR SLAVERY

There are an estimated 3.66 million children, women and men enslaved in the Asia Pacific region today.

Program Casework

Asia Pacific has the highest density of forced labour slavery in the world. Victims are lured by fake job ads, trapped, and forced to provide rigorous manual labour against their will within forced scamming operations, fishing and agricultural industries, gambling rings and involuntary servitude. Forced scamming is sharply on the rise. Victims come from over 35 countries, and are forced to scam for 12-20 hours a day, six days a week. If scam workers do not meet the 'target' or try to escape, they are starved, electrocuted, or beaten.

IJM's Work

In the midst of challenging and volatile socio-political climates, IJM are strengthening justice systems. Because forced labour slavery is fuelled by cross-border trafficking, IJM country teams collaborate regionally to protect inbound migrant workers. As forced scamming rapidly emerged during COVID-19 lockdowns, IJM are pioneering work to rescue and protect victims. IJM is at the cutting edge of this new crime, and have already helped rescue, care for and support victim identification for over 200 victims.



Yaza's Story

In June 2022, Yaza*, 28, applied for a job in online marketing, but when he arrived, he discovered it was a trap. He was trafficked from Myanmar to the Philippines for forced scamming. Under threat of violence, he was forced to meet targets of over \$20,000 a month, through cryptocurrency or other investment scams.

"I felt bad stealing money from innocent people. There were nights that I couldn't sleep well, and I had no appetite to eat," he shared. "I did not think I would ever be able to leave, so I tried to jump off the building, but friends stopped me. Two others jumped and died. I knew of many suicides and heard loud screams and cries of workers being beaten and tortured on the upper floors," recounts Yaza.

In late 2022 Yaza and 20 other survivors were rescued and safely repatriated with support from IJM.

ENDING HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Across Europe, nearly two million people are trafficked across borders into forced labour and sexual exploitation.

Program Casework

Romania is the epicentre of a human trafficking network that spans across Europe. Children, women and men from Romania are transported thousands of miles from home and are exploited for sex and labour, often in western European countries like the UK, Germany, Netherlands and France. A lack of justice system unity between countries, coupled with recent economic distress and a mass influx of Ukrainian refugees, has resulted in a dire situation with millions of people in poverty at risk of slavery.

IJM's Work

By 2030, IJM aims to end impunity for cross-border trafficking through establishing a European Anti-Slavery Centre for Excellence, building a cohesive regional response to these crimes. IJM's operations in Romania will soon expand across the region with a vision to significantly reduce trafficking in persons. Our work ensures survivor access to social services and legal protection both in the country where they experience exploitation as well as their country of origin. IJM training and resources strengthen coordination between law enforcement agents and courts to ensure successful prosecution in cross-border trafficking crimes.



Mara's* Story

Mara* grew up in rural Romania until she began a relationship online with a man who convinced her to move to the UK, promising her a stable job. Instead, night after night, Mara was taken from one city to another to be raped by men. Mara managed to escape with the help of police and return to her small village in Romania — but the abusers remained unrestrained. IJM found Mara in her village and offered to support her through the grueling process of seeking justice in her case. She made the difficult, but inspiring decision to return to the UK and fight for justice.

At the start of 2023 the trial began and Mara, supported and assisted by IJM, courageously shared her testimony in court. The three traffickers were found guilty of human trafficking offences.

"We know there are thousands of victims who are sent home that are never made aware of their rights. They lose their right because they are never informed and there are no structures in place to help. This needs to end."

ENDING FORCED LABOUR SLAVERY

India has over 10 million men, women and children enslaved in bonded labour.

Program Casework

Bonded labour is the most prevalent form of slavery in India. Bonded labour uses deception, threats and violence to coerce people to work for little to no pay, often under false debt bondage. While it is illegal, the lack of enforcement of the law has allowed powerful criminals to enslave and exploit people in brick kilns, rice mills and rock quarries. Victims report being beaten with metal rods, shocked with electrical wires, sexually assaulted, locked in tiny rooms and starved. Pregnant women and children as young as 3 years old cannot escape the hard labour, beatings and abuse.

IJM's Work

Since the year 2000, IJM has partnered with local justice systems to identify and rescue more than 30,000 victims of bonded labour crimes. IJM's point of difference is pioneering a model that puts strengthening the public justice system at the centre. By doing the complex but essential work of creating government and community buy-in, our model has led to sustainable progress that will outlast external interventions or political transitions.



Parobai's Story

Parobai* and her family followed the promise of a better life but ended up trafficked into back-breaking labour at a sugarcane farm. They were forced to cut heavy sugarcane stalks from 5:00am each morning until as late as 1:00am each night. Her husband managed to escape when conditions became unbearable, but Parobai, her two daughters, and three other families remained trapped in violence.

In February 2018, her husband returned with staff from IJM's casework partner Jan Sahas and local law enforcement—bringing Parobai tearfully into freedom.

Today Parobai has become a survivor leader who supports victims after rescue. She is rebuilding her small farm to improve her family's future.

ENDING FORCED LABOUR SLAVERY

Over 2 million children are working in dangerous conditions within the fishing and other manual labour industries.

Program Casework

The multi-million dollar fishing industry in Ghana is propped up by child labour. Boys and girls are trafficked from coastal communities into forced labour slavery. Lake Volta is the epicentre, one of the largest man-made lakes in the world, providing 90% of the national freshwater fish production. Boys and girls are separated from their families and denied an education and basic care. Victims can spend their entire childhood working 18 hours a day in dangerous and harsh conditions, for nothing in return.

IJM's Work

Since 2014, IJM has worked to push back the forces of slavery and violence in Ghana.

IJM's research has found that child slavery persists on a large scale because the laws designed to protect children are not enforced consistently. With that insight, we continue to build strong partnerships with local justice systems – police, courts and government. After making good progress against slavery in the fishing industry, IJM plans to expand into a West Africa Centre for Excellence to counter forced labour slavery in other industries.



Ernest's Story

After his parents got divorced, Ernest's was separated from his siblings and sent to be cared for by an extended family acquaintance. Ernest was told he would go to school, but he was soon pulled out and forced to fish on the lake. Earnest was beaten with a stick or cane if he didn't work hard enough or refused to dive into the cold water to untangle the nets. He worked 12 hours every day, from 3:00am to 3:00pm.

Ernest was rescued in 2019 and reunited with his long-lost siblings in an aftercare shelter.

In August 2022, Ernest and his brother joined a chapter of the Ghana Survivor Network where they have learned to share their story to change the narrative of forced labour in their community.



EAST AFRICA

ENDING VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN & CHILDREN

In Uganda, 35% of girls experience violence before the age of 18 and one in two partnered women in Uganda have experienced spousal abuse. IJM's Uganda office launched in 2004. After reducing violent land theft from widows by 50%, IJM began to address intimate partner violence and sexual violence against children. IJM now plans to expand this casework to surrounding countries.





ANDEAN COMMUNITY

ENDING VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN & CHILDREN

Bolivia, Colombia and Peru are part of IJM's Andean Community Program. In this region, violence directed toward women and children is systemic and persistent. It takes on many forms, including sexual, physical and domestic violence, and femicide. IJM is working with government officials and community partners to strengthen their justice systems, serve survivors, move cases through the justice system more smoothly to deter criminals. IJM Peru opened in 2022, and in 2023 the IJM Andean Community Hub launched, creating better research and collaboration across the region.





KENYA

ENDING POLICE ABUSE OF POWER

In Kenya, people in poverty are afraid to call the police, as rogue police officers may rob, imprison, or even kill those who they are supposed to protect. The persistence of the IJM Kenya team has resulted in convictions and a community demand for good policing. In July 2022, there was victory in the trial for the murder of the Mavoko 3; IJM human rights lawyer Willie Kimani, IJM client Josephat Mwenda and driver Joseph Muiruri. In this landmark trial, three officers and one civilian were convicted of murder.





NORTHERN TRIANGLE

ENDING VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN & CHILDREN

In some neighbourhoods of Guatemala, as many as one in four adolescent girls is a victim of sexual violence. Guatemala consistently bears one of the world's highest femicide rates, meaning women and girls are murdered at a higher rate than almost anywhere else in the world¹.

"The violence and abuse in Guatemala make it one of the worst places in the world to be a child or woman. But for the first time in decades, we are beginning to see the justice system end impunity and provide real hope for the vulnerable." — Juan Miguel Rivera, IJM Regional Vice President, Northern Triangle

Top Highlights from the Year



JUNE 2022

NSW Anti-Slavery Commissioner Appointment

In 2021, you helped IJM to successfully advocate for the NSW Modern Slavery Act to be proclaimed. As a direct result of this Act, on 30 June 2022, Dr James Cockayne was appointed as the NSW Anti-Slavery Commissioner.

NSW is the first jurisdiction in Australia to appoint an Anti-Slavery Commissioner. This role is a significant step forward in Australia's fight against global modern slavery.



SEPTEMBER 2022

Not On Our Screens

Not On Our Screens was a public campaign to raise awareness about the online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC). It addressed the scale, relevance and urgency of how predators (Australia ranks #3 in the world for OSEC users) are using the internet to sexually exploit children.

Not On Our Screens deepened collaboration between IJM Australia and key industry stakeholders, including eSafety and the Australian Federal Police, who partnered with us on the campaign.

The Children in the Pictures Parliamentary Screening

On 9 November 2022, IJM co-hosted a screening of The Children in the Pictures at Parliament House with the Attorney-General Mark Dreyfus and Shadow Minister for Communications, Senator Sarah Henderson.

The event featured eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman-Grant, ACCCE Acting Commander Jayne Crossling, Deputy Director of the Australian Institute of Criminology Dr Rick Brown and Jones Day lawyer Leah Ratcliff. IJM staff were also able to meet with Opposition Leader Peter Dutton on the day, furthering political awareness about OSEC.



MARCH 2023

ABC Foreign Correspondent "Saving the Children"

ABC Foreign Correspondent's piece, 'Saving the Children', focused on the reality of the online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC). Reporter Stephanie March travelled to the Philippines and followed the police's investigation to find a young child who was allegedly being exploited online for profit.

In a devastating conclusion to the episode, the child was not found. However, our team did not stop until the child was found. 7 months later, 6-year-old Jolene* was rescued! This program aired in March 2023, and won an Australian Logie in August 2023 - recognised as the Most Outstanding News Coverage or Public Affairs Report.




